## McLean High School

Margaret Clark Reid was the first high school teacher in Maple Ridge. She had arrived out from Edinburgh, Scotland, with a Master of Arts degree and had first gone to Mt. Lehman. When the school inspector told her that she could get a better salary in Port Haney, she moved. It was during this time that she was courted by John B. Martyn, whom she married in 1917.

Text of the Community Heritage Committee plaque at the Municipality's Peace Park:

In 1922, McLean High School was built between 8th Avenue (224th Street) and 9th Avenue (225th Street), and consisted of two rooms and a laboratory. It was the first school in the district that was built to accommodate high school students. Prior to McLean's construction, high school students had been taught first in the municipal hall in Port Haney and then in the old Maple Ridge School on Laity Street. By the mid 1930s, McLean High had overflowed into the 1909 Haney Public School building nearby, the Manual Training building, and even into the old 1882 Maple Ridge School again. The district tried to raise funds for a new high school by referendum in 1937 but taxpayers turned it down — particularly because the plan included a new fangled extravagance, the indoor gymnasium.

In 1939 the students rebelled at their situation, and staged a protest march from the Ridge (south foot of Laity Street) to McLean High. They made headlines in provincial and national papers and evidently made their point with the district's voters. The referendum was re-submitted, passed, and the new Maple Ridge High School opened in 1941.

On Father's Day, 1953, MRHS burned to the ground. Principal Welland tried to enter to save records, but the firemen stopped him just minutes before parts of the building caved in. The Maple Ridge Volunteer Fire Department, with the assistance of the BC Forest Products' Fire Department, fought to save a small part of the wall adjacent to the old McLean High School in order to prevent it from burning down as well. Even though the newer Maple Ridge High was completely destroyed, McLean High survived. It served as temporary quarters while the already planned MRSS was rushed to completion.

The McLean High School was later converted into the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Motor Vehicle Branch building.
